CHRISTMAS TREE FIRE SAFETY



'Tis the season to keep your family safe from accidental fires during the Christmas season. Christmas tree fires are not common, but when they occur, they are likely to be serious. On average, one of every 18 reported fires that began with a Christmas tree resulted in death. Between 2005-2009, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 240 home fires that started with Christmas trees per year. These fires caused an average of 13 deaths, 27 injuries, and \$16.7 million in direct property damage annually. SPECIAL ELECTION SCHEDULED FOR VIRGINIA SENATE

The special election to fill the 6th District Senate seat vacated by Senator Ralph Northam has been scheduled for January 7, 2014. Senator Ralph Northam was elected as the Lieutenant Governor in the November election.

Delegate Lynwood Lewis of Accomac won the Democratic nomination in a primary held in November. The Republicans nominated Norfolk businessman Wayne Coleman as their candidate.

The 6th District includes Accomack, Northampton and Mathews Counties and parts of Norfolk and Virginia Beach.

The General Assembly convenes January 8, 2014.

TURKEY FRYING

Turkey frying is becoming an increasingly popular way to prepare the main course for that special Thanksgiving meal. However, what most people do not realize is the dangers that come with turkey frying. Turkey fryers use a substantial quantity of cooking oil at very high temperatures. The fryers pose a significant danger that hot oil will be released at some point during the cooking process. Some important points to consider should you choose to fry a turkey this holiday season:

- Hot oil may splash or spill at any point during the cooking process. The fryers are very unstable and could tip very easily. Any contact between the hot oil and skin could result in serious injury or death.
- In deep frying, oil is heated to temperatures of 350 degrees Fahrenheit or more. Cooking oil is combustible, and if it is heated beyond its cooking temperature, its vapors can ignite. Always have a thermometer handy for checking the temperature of the oil. Even if the unit has temperature controls they can fail.
- Propane-fired turkey fryers are designed for outdoor use and should be used away from the house. A deck is not a safe area for use as generally most decks are made of combustible materials.
- Always make sure the turkey is completely thawed. Sticking a partially frozen turkey in hot grease greatly increases the potential for fire.
- Never leave the fryer unattended while it is on.
- Always follow proper instructions on the fryer as to not overfill more than is needed. Most fires start because of overfilling.

Remember to "Freeze the Grease" This Holiday Season



Over the next few weeks, many households will be cooking more than usual as they prepare to host family members for the holidays. That's why the Cape Charles Department of Public Utilities is asking residents to avoid sending fats, oils, and grease (FOG) down the drain.

Any FOG that enters the plumbing system, whether through your kitchen sink or bathroom toilet, can thicken and block pipes, causing sewage to back up into homes. Proper disposal can save you an inconvenient (and expensive) visit from your plumber.

Here are some simple tips to protect your home from nasty sewer back-ups and save you money this holiday season:

- Store any used oil in a can and freeze it for reuse (make sure to strain out any food particles first). Oil can be kept for up to 6 months and reused for up to 6 hours of fry time.
- Pour used oil in a can and place it in the fridge. After the grease hardens, plop the can in the trash.

And remember, turkey grease isn't the only thing you have to be mindful of this holiday season. Many other foods, like salad dressings, butter, ice cream and even baked goods contain large amounts of FOG that can wreak havoc on your sewer system. So be sure to dispose of these foods in the trash as well.

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FROM THE HARBOR MASTER

As winter approaches here are a few things you may want to know:

1. As temperatures drop below freezing, we will begin shutting off the water at the docks. We will try to wait until January 1, 2014 but weather will dictate the date.
2. The main bath house will be closed from January 1, 2014 through March 15, 2014.
3. The Harbor Master's office will remain open throughout the winter per the schedule below:
 - a. Beginning January 2nd the Harbor Master's office will be open from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday; closed on weekends and holidays.
 - b. We do offer after hour fueling, for more information contact the Harbor staff at 757-331-2357.
 - c. The restrooms in the Harbor Master's office will be open 24 hours a day during the winter months
4. Please make sure to winterize your boat as appropriate.
 - a. Your electric bill will reflect on how warm you feel you need to keep your engine and/or cabin. Our electricity is metered currently at \$0.15 per/kw/hr. If your cabin heater has two settings, 1500 or 2500 Watts, this means watts per hour or 1.5 or 2.5 Kilowatts per hour or \$0.225 or \$0.375 per hour. Boats are not as well insulated as homes, therefore in colder temperatures most heaters will not shut off, especially during the night hours. Also engine block heaters use a little more electricity. It is suggested that block heaters be placed on timers. Timers can be set to come on at 9 pm or 10 pm and shut off at 4 am or 5 am and the engine blocks will hold heat for a good period of the day. In our region, it is probably not necessary to use block heaters. Unless you plan to use your boat the following day, a 100 watt drop light near the engine will be sufficient with cost around \$0.15 per 10 hours. This is a big difference in cost.
5. The Cape Charles Yacht Club (CCYC) has started a harbor boat watch. If you wish to participate or want to join the CCYC, please contact Captain Dave at 757-678-2331.
6. Winter Maintenance:
 - a. Staff will be working on good weather days to replace dock boards on the inner harbor boardwalk.
 - b. On bad weather days, staff will be painting and performing basic maintenance in the restrooms and showers to prepare them for next season.

The *Book of Ages, The Life and Opinions of Jane Franklin* by Jill Lepore provides a portrait of the younger sister of Benjamin Franklin who, like Franklin was "a reader, a writer, and a political commentator" but also the mother of twelve children! *Zealot. The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth* by Reza Aslan is a unique and thought-provoking biography. Another interesting title is *Jack London. An American Life* by Earle Labor. In *My Brother, My Sister. Story of a Transformation* by Molly Haskell, the author recounts the story of her brother's transformation, at the age of sixty, from a man to a woman. We follow the author as she moves from shock to acceptance of this controversial subject. *Under the Eagle. Samuel Holiday, Navajo Code Talker* by Samuel Holiday and Robert McPherson is the life story of Holiday, "one of the Navajo men enlisted by the Marine Corps during World War II to use their native language to transmit secret communications on the battlefield."

If you are looking for inspiration, check out *Daily Doses of Wisdom. A Year of Buddhist Inspiration* edited by Josh Bartok. Whatever your beliefs, this book will offer insight and food for thought.

Do you have an adolescent in the house and could use some advice? We have two new titles: *Surviving Your Child's Adolescence. How to Understand and Even Enjoy the Rocky Road to Independence* by Carl Pickhardt and *Growing Up. Limiting Adolescence in a World Desperate for Adults* by Frank C. Strasburger. Although very different, both books will give you useful information. Another book for parents is *Raising Respectful Children in a Disrespectful World* by Jill Rigby.

If a trip is in your future, we have just received *Fodor's Pacific Northwest with Oregon, Washington, and Vancouver* by Fodor's Travel. Many other Fodor titles are available at the library. If we don't have what you want, we will order it for you!

Free Range Learning. How Homeschooling Changes Everything by Laura Grace Weldon is a great title for homeschoolers that discusses the philosophy of homeschooling as well as offering examples and methods for the homeschooler.

Two new health titles are the *Immune System, Recovery Plan. A Doctor's 4-Step Program to Treat Autoimmune Disease* by Susan Blum, M.D. and *Schizophrenia. A Brother Finds Answers in Biological Science* by Ronald Chase.

A fascinating title is *Brilliant Blunders. From Darwin to Einstein. Colossal Mistakes by Great Scientists That Changed Our Understanding of Life and the Universe* by Mario Livio.



PROGRESSIVE COMMUNITY CAROLING TOUR AND HAYRIDE


