TROPICAL STORM ARTHUR - WEATHER BRIEFING

Tropical Storm Arthur is expected to be upgraded to a hurricane sometime early Friday morning. Although the storm will most likely pass to the east of the Town in the Atlantic Ocean, the area may experience winds stronger than normal along with rain Thursday evening and Friday.

There are many homes in Cape Charles that have part time residents. With the impending storm and the possibility of strong winds and heavy rains, it would be prudent for each of us to pay attention to our neighbors' homes. Below is a list of items for consideration to avoid damages from the winds that may come with the storm:

SECURE ALL OUTDOOR ITEMS IN CASE OF STRONG WINDS:

- Lawn / yard furniture (tables, chairs, umbrellas, etc.)
- Grills
- · Decorative items
- · Boat and utility trailers in the yard or the street
- Trash Receptacles
- Please **DO NOT** put any yard debris, brush or other trash on the street curb. Any debris can pose a safety hazard in strong winds and will clog storm drains if any flooding occurs.

If there is any street flooding, **DO NOT** drive your vehicle through high water. If you cannot see the pavement, **DO NOT** go through it as this could cause irreparable damage to your vehicle.


Mayor Proto and the Town staff appreciate everyone's assistance during this period. For emergencies, please call 911 or 678-0458.

The Northampton County Department of Emergency Management will continue to monitor the situation with the National Weather Service. Updates will be issued as necessary depending on the updated information. Updates are typically issued via the Northampton County Emergency Alert System. INFORMATION ON SECURING YOUR BOAT

Harbor Master Smitty Dize offered the following advice to help you prepare and secure your boat:

- If you own a boat that can be taken out of the water, you should do so. Once you get the boat to its destination and if it is going to remain outside, you can do 1 of 2 things:
 - Purchase 4 ground anchors and 2 ratchet straps. Place 2 anchors near the bow on both sides and place 2 anchors near the stern on both sides and run the straps across the top. Have the bow blocked up a little higher than the stern so the water will run out.
 - Make the boat as level as possible, insert the boat plug and fill the boat with water.
- If the boat / vessel must stay at the Harbor or in a marina:
 - Make sure the batteries are fully charged before the storm because the power will most likely be shut off around the docks due to high water.
 - Make sure all scupper holes are clear and that the automatic bilge pumps work properly.
 - Make sure that anything loose is tied down.
 - o When adding extra lines, make sure the lines are at the top of the piling and that all lines leading in the same direction have equal tension. (*Please see diagram*)
